About the Effect this City Had on Arriving Travelers after a Long and Wearisome Journey the Traveler Seized from a Distance Towers Rising High into the Air and like Strong Giants in Stride Columns That Rise Up to the Highest Point and Tall Houses and Temples Whose Vast Roofs Reached to the Heights Who Would Not Become Instantly Filled with Joy and When He Reaches the Wall and Draws near to the Gates Who Does Not Greet the City Lower His Neck Kneel to the Ground and Grasp the Famous Earth but over the Preceding Centuries the World around Constantinople Had Changed in Western Europe the Post Roman Era Had Given Way to the Middle Ages the Latin Speaking Western Empire Had Fractured and Made Way for a Patchwork of Kingdoms

The Moment a New Emperor Was Crowned and Were Usually Given some Inconsequential Position Where They Could Cause Little Trouble It Was Also Imperial Policy That no General Was Allowed To Command Troops in His Home Province a Rule Designed To Prevent any General from Building Up Too Large a Base of Support and Challenging the Authority of the Empire as We Saw in the Last Episode this Was a Policy That the Han Dynasty of China Would Have Done Well To Adopt as a Further Insurance Policy Many Emperor's Gave Positions of Power to those Who Could Not Take the Throne

The Final Insurance Policy of any Emperor Was Ensuring that He Had a Solid Base of Support among the Actual People of the Empire and Its Political Elites if People Supported Their Emperor Then It Was Less Likely that a Coup Could Succeed and So Emperor's Spent Much of Their Time Trying To Increase this Support Especially in the Great City of Constantinople despite the Reputation It Has Earned in the West's Despotic Emperor's Didn't Last Long in Byzantium in the Centuries Following the Rise of Islam the Byzantine Empire Became Exceptional at Projecting What We Might Call Soft In the Year 946 One Delegation from Silesia Were Greeted in the Reception Hall of the Imperial Palace Decked Out with Silk Hangings Laurel Wreaths and Flowers and Slung with Silver Chains the Floors all Decorated with Persian Carpets and the Whole Vast Rooms Sprinkled with Rose Water the Entire Court Stood There in Ceremonial Regalia of Red Gold and Purple Thousands of People Chanting along with the Music of Organs Meanwhile the Emperor Sat on a Throne Modeled after the Biblical Throne of Solomon Surrounded by Mechanical Moving Animals Powered by Water and Clockwork Birds and Lions Castes in Silver That Roared and Warbled through Intricately Designed Instruments in Their Throats this Throne Could Even Be Mechanically Lifted into the Air while the Ambassador's Knelt before It all of this Theater Served To Impress and Terrify those Who Visited the Empire

We Knew Not whether We Were in Heaven or Earth for on Earth There Is no Such Splendor or Such Beauty We Only Knew that God Dwells There among Men and Their Service Is Fair in the

Ceremonies of Other Nations but Soft Power Didn't Always Suffice and When It Failed There Was Always the Byzantine Army You the Army of Byzantium Was a Large and Powerful Force in the Mid 10th Century It Was Made Up of Roughly a Hundred and Forty Thousand Soldiers this Was Around 1 % of the Empire's Population

We Were Pressed on all Sides by the Bonds of Death for Centuries Now Western Europe Had Relied on the Byzantines To Hold Back the Armies of the Various Muslim Empires That Had Risen and Fallen in Asia but It Was Becoming Increasingly Clear that They Couldn't Hold Out on Their Own Forever if Byzantium Was To Continue What the West Saw as Guarding the Gates of Europe It Would Need a Greater Level of Military Support in Fact It Would Need a Radical Solution That Would Reshape the Balance of Power in Europe into

But He Would Get Much Much More than He Bargained for on the 27th of November 1095 Pope Urban II Called Together the Council of Clermont and Urged All those Present To Take Up Arms under the Sign of the Cross for Centuries Now European Pilgrims Had Travelled to Jerusalem to the Site Where that Jewish Rebel Had Been Executed by the Occupying Roman Forces and Where the World's Largest Religion Had Been Born as We've Seen this Pilgrimage Route Usually Took Them through Byzantium Crossing the Bosphorus at Constantinople and Passing through the Silesian Gates into Syria and down the Coast of the Mediterranean

One Might Have Likened Them to the Stars of Heaven or the Sand Poured Out along the Edge of the Sea for these Men That Hurried On To Approach Constantinople or As Many as There Are Leaves and Flowers in the Springtime this Unruly Horde Is Thought To Have Contained More than a Hundred Thousand People a Vast Migration of Westerners into the East It Was Made Up Largely of Mobs of Poor Peasants Gathered from All the Towns and Villages of Western Europe and Had Marched across the Continent Looting and Stealing Everywhere They Passed through They Had Only Got As Far as the Rhineland in Germany

And if this Unruly Army Was What It Would Take To Protect His Empire Then He Was Have To Accept It so He Allowed this Vast Crusader Army To Cross the Bosphorus and Helped Them with Organization and Supplies while They Passed into Anatolia through the Gates of Silesia and into the Holy Land and the Crusaders despite Their General Lack of Experience and Equipment Did Very Well Their Vast Army Took the City of Nicaea in 1097 and Antioch a Year after that Jerusalem Was Reached in June of 1099 and Taken by an Assault One Month Later with the Crusaders Massacring

The Power of the Crusades Demonstrated to the Byzantines that Western Europe Was No Longer a Distant Backwater the Scattered Remnants of the Western Empire It Had Become a World of Its Own with Its Own Tensions Its Own Conflicts and Its Own Interests the Deal That Alexios Had Made Had Unleashed Dark Forces That Would Ultimately Spiral out of Control and Bring the Whole Empire of Byzantium to the Brink of Destruction this Would all Finally Come to a Head during Perhaps the Most Disgraceful Campaign Conducted by a Crusading Army in the East

The Leaders of the Crusader Army Perhaps Wisely Chose Not To Pass News of Their Excommunication Down to Their Men but while Many Viewed the Presence of this Vast Unruly Army as a Danger Others Saw in It an Opportunity One of these Men Was Named alexius the Fourth and Jell-O's Alexius Had Been the Son of a Byzantine Emperor but His Father Had Been Deposed in a Coup and Now He Lived in Exile with His Brother-in-Law the King of Germany Angelus Lived Much of His Early Life in a State of Great Bitterness about His Family's Loss and He Must Have Spent Long Hours Fantasizing about Returning Himself to the Throne of Byzantium

We Made Our Way towards a Certain Heavily Fortified Tower Known as Galata a Very Great Excessively Thick Iron Chain Was Fastened to It It Ran across the Sea Stretching from the Tower All the Way to the City Walls after a Number of Unsuccessful Assaults with the Crusaders Taking Heavy

Losses on the 12th of April They Were Finally Successful They Landed Their Ships below the Sea Walls of Constantinople Much Lower than the Land Walls in the West They Anchored Their Ships below the Walls and Swarmed Up Their Masts Scrambling across Catwalks To Reach the Ramparts Other Ships Landed on the Shore Line and Used Picks and Shovels To Hack Away at a Gateway That the Defenders Had Hurriedly Bricked Up the City's Defenders Were Beaten Back and the Crusaders Managed To Break the Chain That Hung over the Golden Horn

They Anchored Their Ships below the Walls and Swarmed Up Their Masts Scrambling across Catwalks To Reach the Ramparts Other Ships Landed on the Shore Line and Used Picks and Shovels To Hack Away at a Gateway That the Defenders Had Hurriedly Bricked Up the City's Defenders Were Beaten Back and the Crusaders Managed To Break the Chain That Hung over the Golden Horn They Sailed into the Port of Constantinople

Soon Found that He Had Vastly Overestimated the Wealth He Would Find in the Imperial Treasury a Century of Civil Wars At All but Emptied It and When the Previous Emperor Fled the City He Had Taken with Him More than a Thousand Pounds of Gold along with Priceless Jewels with the Large and Unruly Crusader Army Still Camped Restless and Impatient in the City Awaiting Their Payment the New Emperor Angelus Ordered that the Funds Should Be Raised by any Means Necessary He Ordered Soldiers To March through the Streets Bursting into Churches and Taking any Priceless Works of Byzantine Art That They Could Find these Were To Be Destroyed and Melted Down To Strip Them of Their Gold the Site of this New Emperor Sending Troops into the Churches To Destroy Their Treasures

And They Did Not Know that They Served Up Bile like Wine nor that They Would Treat the Byzantines with Utter Contempt Declaring a Great Victory for Christendom the Crusaders Selected an Emperor from among Their Ranks and Divided the Territory of the Empire into Various New Crusader States the Byzantine Empire Fractured Constantinople Was Ruled by a Western Emperor for the Next 60 Years and Its Citizens Referred to this Regime as Frankoc Rottier or the Rule of the Franks but the Latins Soon Found that Governing this Large and Fractious Empire Was no Easy Matter over the Course of Their Rule

Just two weeks before his death in January 1999, George L. Mosse, one of this century's great historians, finished writing his memoir, a fascinating and fluent account of a remarkable life that spanned three continents and many of the major events of the twentieth century. Writing about the events of his life through a historian's lens, Mosse gives us a personal history of our century. This is a story told with the clarity, passion, and verve that entranced thousands of Mosse's students and that countless readers have found, and will continue to find, in his scholarly books. This book describes Mosse's opulent childhood in Weimar Berlin; his exile in Parts and England, including boarding school and study at Cambridge University; his second exile in the U.S. at Haverford, Harvard, Iowa, and Wisconsin; and his extended stays in London and Jerusalem. Mosse also deals with matters of personal identity. He discusses being a Jew and his attachment to Israel and Zionism. He addresses his gayness, his coming out, and his growing scholarly interest in issues of sexuality. This touching memoir, sometimes harrowing, often humorous, is guided in part by Mosse's belief that "what man is, only history tells," and by his constant themes of the fate of liberalism, the defining events that can bring about the generational political awakenings of youth (from the anti-fascism struggles of the 1930s to the campus anti-war movement of the 1960s, the meanings of masculinity and racial and sexual stereotypes, the enigma of exile, and - most of all - the importance of finding one's self through the pursuit of truth, and through an honest and unflinching analysis of one's place in the context of the times.

Contemporary Europe in the Historical Imagination

George L. Mosse (1918-99) was one of the most influential cultural and intellectual historians of modern Europe. A refugee from Nazi Germany, he was an early leader in the study of fascism and the history of sexuality and masculinity, authoring more than two dozen books. In *Contemporary Europe in the Historical Imagination*, an international assembly of leading scholars explore Mosse's enduring methodologies in German studies and modern European cultural history. Considering Mosse's life and work historically and critically, the book begins with his intellectual biography and goes on to reread his writings in light of historical developments since his death, and to use, extend, and contend with Mosse's legacy in new contexts he may not have addressed or even foreseen. The volume wrestles with intertwined questions that continue to emerge from Mosse's pioneering research, including: What role do sexual and racial stereotypes play in European political culture before and after 1945? How

are gender and Nazi violence bound together? And what does commemoration reveal about national culture? Importantly, the contributors pose questions that are inspired by Mosse's work but that he did not directly examine. For example, to what extent were Nazism and Italian Fascism colonial projects? How have popular radical right parties reinforced and reimagined ethnonationalism and nativism? And how did Nazi perpetrators construct a moral system that accommodated genocide? Much like Mosse's own work, the chapters in this book inspire new interventions into the history of gender and sexuality, Jewish identity during the rise of the Third Reich, and the many reincarnations of fascist pageantry and mass politics.

The Pen Confronts the Sword

Demonstrates how four books by dissident German intellectuals served as a rebuke to the Nazi regime. During 1942, the decisive battles of Stalingrad and El Alamein raged and the Nazi genocide was at its lethal peak. *The Pen Confronts the Sword* examines the shared motives behind four remarkable texts German exiles began writing that year: Thomas Mann's *Doctor Faustus* (1947); Ernst Cassirer's *The Myth of the State* (1946); Erich Auerbach's *Mimesis: The Representation of Reality in Western Literature* (1946); and Max Horkheimer and Theodor Adorno's *Dialectic of Enlightenment* (1944). Each identified a specific danger in Nazi ideology and mustered new theories, approaches, and sources to combat it. The books aimed to expose the encompassing catastrophes of German culture (Mann), politics (Cassirer), philology (Auerbach), and philosophy and sociology (Horkheimer and Adorno). Their scope, mastery, and sense of urgency constitute a comprehensive *Kulturkampf* (culture war) against Nazi barbarism. Avihu Zakai cogently analyzes each work, explains the context of its creation, and draws connections between these four landmark books in Western intellectual history. History, Historians, and Autobiography

Though history and autobiography both claim to tell true stories about the past, historians have traditionally rejected first-person accounts as subjective and therefore unreliable. What then, asks Jeremy D. Popkin in *History, Historians, and Autobiography*, are we to make of the ever-increasing number of professional historians who are publishing stories of their own lives? And how is this recent development changing the nature of history-writing, the historical profession, and the genre of autobiography? Drawing on the theoretical work of contemporary critics of autobiography and the philosophy of Paul Ricoeur, Popkin reads the autobiographical classics of Edward Gibbon and Henry Adams and the memoirs of contemporary historians such as Emmanuel Le Roy Ladurie, Peter Gay, Jill Ker Conway, and many others, he reveals the contributions historians' life stories make to our understanding of the human experience. Historians' autobiographies, he shows, reveal how scholars arrive at their vocations, the difficulties of writing about modern professional life, and the ways in which personal stories can add to our understanding of historical events such as war, political movements, and the traumas of the Holocaust. An engrossing overview of the way historians view themselves and their profession, this work will be of interest to readers concerned with the ways in which we understand the past, as well as anyone interested in the art of life-writing.

What History Tells

What History Tells presents an impressive collection of critical papers from the September 2001 conference "An Historian's Legacy: George L. Mosse and Recent Research on Fascism, Society, and Culture." This book examines his historiographical legacy first within the context of his own life and the internal development of his work, and secondly by tracing the many ways in which Mosse influenced the subsequent study of contemporary history, European cultural history and modern Jewish history. The contributors include Walter Laqueur, David Sabeau, Johann Sommerville, Emilio Gentile, Roger Griffin, Saul Friedländer, Jay Winter, Rudy Koshar, Robert Nye, Janna Bourke, Shulamit Volkov, and Steven E. Aschheim.

The Perils of Normalcy

A taboo-breaker and a great provocateur, George L. Mosse (1918–99) was one of the great historians of the twentieth century, forging a new historiography of culture that included brilliant insights about the roles of nationalism, fascism, racism, and sexuality. Jewish, gay, and a member of a culturally elite family in Germany, Mosse came of age as the Nazis came to power, before escaping as a teenager to England and America. Mosse was innovative and interdisciplinary as a scholar, and he shattered in his groundbreaking books prevalent assumptions about the nature of National Socialism and the Holocaust. He audaciously drew a link from bourgeois respectability and the ideology of the Enlightenment—the very core of modern Western civilization—to the extermination of the European Jews. In this intellectual biography of George Mosse, Karel Plessini draws on all of Mosse's published and unpublished work to illuminate the origins and development of his groundbreaking methods of historical analysis and the close link between his life and work. He redefined the understanding of modern mass society and politics, masterfully revealing the powerful influence of conformity and political liturgies on twentieth-century history. Mosse warned against the dangers inherent in acquiescence, showing how identity creation and ideological fervor can climax in intolerance and mass murder—a message of continuing relevance.

Those Who Forget

Those Who Forget, published to international awards and acclaim, is journalist Géraldine Schwarz's riveting account of her German and French grandparents' lives during World War II, an in-depth history of Europe's post-war reckoning with fascism, and an urgent appeal to remember as a defense against today's rise of far-right nationalism. During World War II, Géraldine Schwarz's German grandparents were neither heroes nor villains; they were merely *Mitläufer*—those who followed the current. Once the war ended, they wanted to bury the past under the wreckage of the Third Reich. Decades later, while delving through filing cabinets in the basement of their apartment building in Mannheim, Schwarz discovers that in 1938, her paternal grandfather Karl took advantage of Nazi policies to buy a business from a Jewish family for a low price. She finds letters from the only survivor of this family (all the others perished in Auschwitz), demanding reparations. But Karl Schwarz refused to acknowledge his responsibility. Géraldine starts to question the past: How guilty were her grandparents? What makes us complicit? On her mother's side, she investigates the role of her French grandfather, a policeman in Vichy. Weaving together the threads of three generations of her family story with Europe's process of post-war reckoning, Schwarz explores how millions were seduced by ideology, overcome by a fog of denial after the war, and, in Germany at least, eventually managed to transform collective guilt into democratic responsibility. She asks: How can nations learn from history? And she observes that countries that avoid confronting the past are especially vulnerable to extremism. Searing and unforgettable, *Those Who Forget* is a riveting memoir, an illuminating history, and an urgent call for remembering.

Nazi Culture

George L. Mosse's extensive analysis of Nazi culture - ground-breaking upon its original publication in 1966 - is now offered to readers of a new generation. Selections from newspapers, novellas, plays, and diaries as well as the public pronouncements of Nazi leaders, churchmen, and professors describe National Socialism in practice and explore what it meant for the average German.

Jews, Catholics, and the Burden of History

Volume XXI of the distinguished annual *Studies in Contemporary Jewry* marks sixty years since the end of the Second World War and forty years since the Second Vatican Council's efforts to revamp Church relations with the Jewish people and the Jewish faith. *Jews, Catholics, and the Burden of History* offers a collection of new scholarship on the nature of the Jewish-Catholic encounter between 1945 and 2005, with an emphasis on how this relationship has emerged from the shadow of the Holocaust.

Fascination with the Persecutor

In 1933, George L. Mosse fled Berlin and settled in the United States, where he went on to become a renowned historian at the University of Wisconsin–Madison. Through rigorous and innovative scholarship, Mosse uncovered the forces that spurred antisemitism, racism, nationalism, and populism. His transformative work was propelled by a desire to know his own persecutors and has been vital to

generations of scholars seeking to understand the cultural and intellectual origins and mechanisms of Nazism. This translation makes Emilio Gentile's groundbreaking study of Mosse's life and work available to English language readers. A leading authority on fascism, totalitarianism, and Mosse's legacy, Gentile draws on a wealth of published and unpublished material, including letters, interviews, lecture plans, and marginalia from Mosse's personal library. Gentile details how the senior scholar eschewed polemics and employed rigorous academic standards to better understand fascism and the "catastrophe of the modern man"—how masculinity transformed into a destructive ideology. As long as wars are waged over political beliefs in popular culture, Mosse's theories of totalitarianism will remain as relevant as ever.

The Lost Region

The American Midwest is an orphan among regions. In comparison to the South, the far West, and New England, its history has been sadly neglected. To spark more attention to their region, midwestern historians will need to explain the Midwest's crucial roles in the development of the entire country: it helped spark the American Revolution and stabilized the young American republic by strengthening its economy and endowing it with an agricultural heartland; it played a critical role in the Union victory in the Civil War; it extended the republican institutions created by the American founders, and then its settler populism made those institutions more democratic; it weakened and decentered the cultural dominance of the urban East; and its bustling land markets deepened Americans' embrace of capitalist institutions and attitudes. In addition to outlining the centrality of the Midwest to crucial moments in American history, Jon K. Lauck resurrects the long-forgotten stories of the institutions founded by an earlier generation of midwestern historians, from state historical societies to the Mississippi Valley Historical Association. Their strong commitment to local and regional communities rooted their work in place and gave it an audience outside the academy. He also explores the works of these scholars, showing that they researched a broad range of themes and topics, often pioneering fields that remain vital today. *The Lost Region* demonstrates the importance of the Midwest, the depth of historical work once written about the region, the continuing insights that can be gleaned from this body of knowledge, and the lessons that can be learned from some of its prominent historians, all with the intent of once again finding the forgotten center of the nation and developing a robust historiography of the Midwest.

Pioneering History on Two Continents

Bruce F. Pauley draws on his family and personal history to tell a story that examines the lives of Volga Germans during the eighteenth century, the pioneering experiences of his family in late-nineteenth-century Nebraska, and the dramatic transformations influencing the history profession during the second half of the twentieth century. An award-winning historian of antisemitism, Nazism, and totalitarianism, Pauley helped shape historical interpretation from the 1970s to the '90s both in the United States and Central Europe. *Pioneering History on Two Continents* provides an intimate look at the shifting approaches to the historian's craft during a volatile period of world history, with an emphasis on twentieth-century Central European political, social, and diplomatic developments. It also examines the greater sweep of history through the author's firsthand experiences as well as those of his ancestors, who participated in these global currents through their migration from Germany to the steppes of Russia to the Great Plains of the United States.

History After Hitler

A comprehensive account of how German and American historians after World War II tackled the question of the roots of National Socialism, *History After Hitler* traces the development of a transatlantic scholarly community as a key part of the intellectual history of the Federal Republic and of Cold War German-American relations.

History Hunting

The book offers guidance to aspiring historians at every stage and in every walk of life, from practical advice on tackling and organizing projects to recommendations for finding and using resources of

all kinds, whether at the local library or historical society or on the world wide web. It is intended to be a serious guide to the best practices for researchers as well as a good read as a collection of research stories. The author includes useful bibliographies, vetted websites, and practical advice on doing research well.

History in the Plural

Reinhart Koselleck (1923–2006) was one of most imposing and influential European intellectual historians in the twentieth century. Constantly probing and transgressing the boundaries of mainstream historical writing, he created numerous highly innovative approaches, absorbing influences from other academic disciplines as represented in the work of philosophers and political thinkers like Hans Georg Gadamer and Carl Schmitt and that of internationally renowned scholars such as Hayden White, Michel Foucault, and Quentin Skinner. An advocate of "grand theory," Koselleck was an inspiration to many scholars and helped move the discipline into new directions (such as conceptual history, theories of historical times and memory) and across disciplinary and national boundaries. He thus achieved a degree of international fame that was unusual for a German historian after 1945. This book not only presents the life and work of a "great thinker" and European intellectual, it also contributes to our understanding of complex theoretical and methodological issues in the cultural sciences and to our knowledge of the history of political, historical, and cultural thought in Germany from the 1950s to the present.

European and Latin American Social Scientists as Refugees, Émigrés and Return Migrants

During the 1930s, thousands of social scientists fled the Nazi regime or other totalitarian European regimes, mainly towards the Americas. The New School for Social Research (NSSR) in New York City and El Colegio de México (Colmex) in Mexico City both were built based on receiving exiled academics from Europe. Comparing the first twenty years of these organizations, this book offers a deeper understanding of the corresponding institutional contexts and impacts of emigrated, exiled and refugee academics. It analyses the ambiguities of scientists' situations between emigration, return migration and transnational life projects and examines the corresponding dynamics of application, adaptation or amalgamation of (travelling) theories and methods these academics brought. Despite its institutional focus, it also deals with the broader context of forced migration of intellectuals and scientists in the second half of the last century in Europe and Latin America. In so doing, the book invites a deeper understanding of the challenges of forced migration for scholars in the 21st century.

In Times of Crisis

The nineteenth- and twentieth-century relationship between European culture, German history, and the Jewish experience produced some of the West's most powerful and enduring intellectual creations—and, perhaps in subtly paradoxical and interrelated ways, our century's darkest genocidal moments. In *Times of Crisis* explores the flashpoints of this vexed relationship, mapping the coordinates of a complex triangular encounter of immense historical import. In essays that range from the question of Nietzsche's legacy to the controversy over Daniel Goldhagen's *Hitler's Willing Executioners*, the distinguished historian Steven E. Aschheim presents this encounter as an ongoing dialogue between two evolving cultural identities. He touches on past dimensions of this exchange (such as the politics of Weimar Germany) and on present dilemmas of grasping and representing it (such as the Israeli discourse on the Holocaust). His work inevitably traces the roots and ramifications of Nazism but at the same time brings into focus historical circumstances and contemporary issues often overshadowed or distorted by the Holocaust. These essays reveal the ubiquitous charged inscriptions of Nazi genocide within our own culture and illuminate the projects of some later thinkers and historians—from Hannah Arendt to George Mosse to Saul Friedlander—who have wrestled with its problematics and sought to capture its essence. From the broadly historical to the personal, from the politics of Weimar Germany to the experience of growing up German Jewish in South Africa, the essays expand our understanding of German Jewish history in particular, but also of historical processes in general.

The Nationalization of the Masses

First published in 1975, *The Nationalization of the Masses* is George L. Mosse's major statement about political symbols and the means of their diffusion. Focusing on Germany and, to a lesser degree, France and Italy, Mosse analyzes the role of symbols in fueling mass politics, mass movements, and nationalism in a way that is broadly applicable and as relevant today as it was almost fifty years ago.

In this analysis Mosse introduces terms like “secular religion,” “political liturgy,” “national mystique,” “the new politics,” and “the aesthetics of politics” that are now standard in studies of nationalism and fascism, demonstrating the importance of his cultural, anthropologically informed lens to contemporary discourse. This new edition contains a critical introduction by Victoria de Grazia, Moore Collegiate Professor of History at Columbia University, contextualizing Mosse’s research and exploring its powerful influence on subsequent generations of historians.

Art of Suppression

One thinks of the arts in Nazi Germany as struggling in an oppressive system, yet evidence has repeatedly shown that conditions were far more favourable than we assume. Potter conducts a historiography of Nazi arts, examining writings from the last seven decades to demonstrate how historical, moral, and intellectual conditions have sustained a distorted characterization of cultural life in the Third Reich. Showing how past research has revealed the decentralized nature of Nazi arts policies, Potter argues that the insulation of academic disciplines allowed outdated presumptions about Nazi micromanagement of the arts to persist.

The Burden of German History

As one of the leading historians of Modern Europe and an internationally acclaimed scholar for the past five decades, Konrad H. Jarausch presents a sustained academic reflection on the post-war German effort to cope with the guilt of the Holocaust amongst a generation of scholars too young to have been perpetrators. Ranging from his war-time childhood to Americanization as a foreign student, from his development as a professional historian to his directorship of the Zentrum für Zeithistorische Forschung and concluding with his mentorship of dozens of PhDs, *The Burden of German History* reflects on the emergence of a self-critical historiography of a twentieth-century Germany that was wrestling with the responsibility for war and genocide. This partly professional and partly personal autobiography explores a wide range of topics including the development of German historiography and its methodological debates, the interdisciplinary teaching efforts in German studies, and the role of scholarly organizations and institutions.

A History of Italian Fascist Culture, 1922–1943

Alessandra Tarquini’s *A History of Italian Fascist Culture, 1922–1943* is widely recognized as an authoritative synthesis of the field. The book was published to much critical acclaim in 2011 and revised and expanded five years later. This long-awaited translation presents Tarquini’s compact, clear prose to readers previously unable to read it in the original Italian. Tarquini sketches the universe of Italian fascism in three broad directions: the regime’s cultural policies, the condition of various art forms and scholarly disciplines, and the ideology underpinning the totalitarian state. She details the choices the ruling class made between 1922 and 1943, revealing how cultural policies shaped the country and how intellectuals and artists contributed to those decisions. The result is a view of fascist ideology as a system of visions, ideals, and, above all, myths capable of orienting political action and promoting a precise worldview. Building on George L. Mosse’s foundational research, Tarquini provides the best single-volume work available to fully understand a complex and challenging subject. It reveals how the fascists used culture—art, cinema, music, theater, and literature—to build a conservative revolution that purported to protect the traditional social fabric while presenting itself as maximally oriented toward the future.

In the Shadow of Statues

Equal parts unblinking memoir, history, and prescription for finally confronting America's most painful legacy, *In the Shadow of Statues* will contribute strongly to the national conversation about race in the age of Donald Trump, at a time when racism is resurgent with seemingly tacit approval from the highest levels of government and when too many Americans have a misplaced nostalgia for a time and place that never existed.

An Academic Life

A compelling memoir by the first woman president of a major American university Hanna Holborn Gray has lived her entire life in the world of higher education. The daughter of academics, she fled Hitler's Germany with her parents in the 1930s, emigrating to New Haven, where her father was a professor at Yale University. She has studied and taught at some of the world's most prestigious universities. She was the first woman to serve as provost of Yale. In 1978, she became the first woman president of a major research university when she was appointed to lead the University of Chicago, a position she held for fifteen years. In 1991, Gray was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian honor, in recognition of her extraordinary contributions to education. *An Academic Life* is a candid self-portrait by one of academia's most respected trailblazers. Gray describes what it was like to grow up as a child of refugee parents, and reflects on the changing status of women in the academic world. She discusses the migration of intellectuals from Nazi-held Europe and the transformative role these exiles played in American higher education—and how the émigré experience in America transformed their own lives and work. She sheds light on the character of university communities, how they are structured and administered, and the balance they seek between tradition and innovation, teaching and research, and undergraduate and professional learning. *An Academic Life* speaks to the fundamental issues of purpose, academic freedom, and governance that arise time and again in higher education, and that pose sharp challenges to the independence and scholarly integrity of each new generation.

The Holocaust, Fascism and Memory

From interpretations of the Holocaust to fascist thought and anti-fascists' responses, this book tackles topics which are rarely studied in conjunction. This is a unique collection of essays on a wide variety of subjects, which contributes to understanding the roots and consequences of mid-twentieth-century Europe's great catastrophe.

The European Jews, Patriotism and the Liberal State, 1789-1939

This book uses historical, sociological, theological, social-psychological, and especially literary insights to depict various forms of European Jewish patriotism from the French Revolution until the Holocaust, combining scrutiny of long-term socio-historical and religious forces with more recent factors deriving from the rise of secular enlightenment, emancipation and nationalism.

Being a Historian

Considers what aspiring and mature historians need to know about the discipline of history in the United States today.

The Memory Phenomenon in Contemporary Historical Writing

In this book, the author provides a comprehensive overview of the intense and sustained work on the relationship between collective memory and history, retracing the royal roads pioneering scholars have traveled in their research and writing on this topic: notably, the politics of commemoration (purposes and practices of public remembrance); the changing uses of memory worked by new technologies of communication (from the threshold of literacy to the digital age); the immobilizing effects of trauma upon memory (with particular attention to the remembered legacy of the Holocaust). He follows with an analysis of the implications of this scholarship for our thinking about history itself, with attention to such issues as the mnemonics of historical time, and the encounter between representation and experience in historical understanding. His book provides insight into the way interest in the concept of memory - as opposed to long-standing alternatives, such as myth, tradition, and heritage - has opened

new vistas for scholarship not only in cultural history but also in shared ventures in memory studies in related fields in the humanities and social sciences.

Dreaming of Michelangelo

Dreaming of Michelangelo is the first book-length study to explore the intellectual and cultural affinities between modern Judaism and the life and work of Michelangelo Buonarroti. It argues that Jewish intellectuals found themselves in the image of Michelangelo as an "unrequited lover" whose work expressed loneliness and a longing for humanity's response. The modern Jewish imagination thus became consciously idolatrous. Writers brought to life—literally—Michelangelo's sculptures, seeing in them their own worldly and emotional struggles. The Moses statue in particular became an archetype of Jewish liberation politics as well as a central focus of Jewish aesthetics. And such affinities extended beyond sculpture: Jewish visitors to the Sistine Chapel reinterpreted the ceiling as a manifesto of prophetic socialism, devoid of its Christian elements. According to Biemann, the phenomenon of Jewish self-recognition in Michelangelo's work offered an alternative to the failed promises of the German enlightenment. Through this unexpected discovery, he rethinks German Jewish history and its connections to Italy, the Mediterranean, and the art of the Renaissance.

Confronting Devastation

An anthology of excerpts from twenty memoirs who survived the Holocaust in Hungary.

Israeli Holocaust Research

This book traces the development of Holocaust research in Israel from the late 1940s, its consolidation as an academic subject, and the establishment and development of Yad Vashem. It contextualises this evolution in terms of developments in Europe and the US as well as public discourse on the Holocaust.

Jewish Exiles and European Thought during the Third Reich

A study of how forced exile from 1930s Germany informed the scholarship of four German-speaking, Jewish intellectuals.

British Antifascism and the Holocaust, 1945–79

British Antifascism and the Holocaust, 1945–79 explores the extent to which the Holocaust has shaped British antifascism. The author tests assertions of an uncomplicated relationship between Holocaust memory and the imperative to resist postwar fascist revivals. For those with a scholarly interest in how antifascists confront their opponents, it is essential to understand whether the Holocaust has always been seen as an insurmountable barrier against fascism: is the idea of the genocide's constant antifascist 'use' actually a dangerous assumption and, if so, what are the implications of this for 'Antifa' as its battle with the contemporary far right unfolds? This book provides a political and structural history of the Holocaust's relationship to antifascist organisations and questions whether networks of solidarity formed around Holocaust memory, including analysing the impact of the genocide in Jewish antifascists' motivations and rhetoric. It also assesses the Holocaust's political capital in wider antifascism and connected anti-racism, including in defence of the Black and Asian communities increasingly victimised by fascists over the postwar period. This book will appeal to scholars and students with interests in antifascism, fascism, racism, and Jewish and left-wing history in Britain, and how these intersect with Holocaust consciousness.

Leaders in the Historical Study of American Education

This volume consists of twenty six autobiographical essays by leading historians of American education which document the enormous variety of paths taken to get into this field. On the Eve

On the Eve is the portrait of a world on the brink of annihilation. In this provocative book, Bernard Wasserstein presents a new and disturbing interpretation of the collapse of European Jewish civilization even before the Nazi onslaught. In the 1930s, as Europe spiraled toward the Second World War, the continent's Jews faced an existential crisis. The harsh realities of the age—anti-Semitic persecution, economic discrimination, and an ominous climate of violence—devastated Jewish communities and shattered the lives of individuals. The Jewish crisis was as much the result of internal decay as of external attack. Demographic collapse, social disintegration, and cultural dissolution were all taking their toll. The problem was not just Nazism: In the summer of 1939 more Jews were behind barbed wire outside the Third Reich than within it, and not only in police states but even in the liberal democracies of the West. The greater part of Europe was being transformed into a giant concentration camp for Jews. Unlike most previous accounts, *On the Eve* focuses not on the anti-Semites but on the Jews. Wasserstein refutes the common misconception that they were unaware of the gathering forces of their enemies. He demonstrates that there was a growing and widespread recognition among Jews that they stood on the edge of an abyss. *On the Eve* recaptures the agonizing sorrows and the effervescent cultural glories of this last phase in the history of the European Jews. It explores their hopes, anxieties, and ambitions, their family ties, social relations, and intellectual creativity—everything that made life meaningful and bearable for them. Wasserstein introduces a diverse array of characters: holy men and hucksters, beggars and bankers, politicians and poets, housewives and harlots, and, in an especially poignant chapter, children without a future. The geographical range also is vast: from Vilna (the "Jerusalem of the North") to Amsterdam, Vienna, Warsaw, and Paris, from the Judeo-Español-speaking stevedores of Salonica to the Yiddish-language collective farms of Soviet Ukraine and Crimea. Wasserstein's aim is to "breathe life into dry bones." Based on comprehensive research, rendered with compassion and empathy, and brought alive by telling anecdotes and dry wit, *On the Eve* offers a vivid and enlightening picture of the European Jews in their final hour.

The New Faces of Fascism

What is fascism in the twenty first century? What does Fascism mean at the beginning of the twenty-first century? When we pronounce this word, our memory goes back to the years between the two world wars and envisions a dark landscape of violence, dictatorships, and genocide. These images spontaneously surface in the face of the rise of radical right, racism, xenophobia, islamophobia and terrorism, the last of which is often depicted as a form of "Islamic fascism." Beyond some superficial analogies, however, all these contemporary tendencies reveal many differences from historical fascism, probably greater than their affinities. Paradoxically, the fear of terrorism nourishes the populist and racist rights, with Marine Le Pen in France or Donald Trump in the US claiming to be the most effective ramparts against "Jihadist fascism". But since fascism was a product of imperialism, can we define as fascist a terrorist movement whose main target is Western domination? Disentangling these contradictory threads, Enzo Traverso's historical gaze helps to decipher the enigmas of the present. He suggests the concept of post-fascism--a hybrid phenomenon, neither the reproduction of old fascism nor something completely different--to define a set of heterogeneous and transitional movements, suspended between an accomplished past still haunting our memories and an unknown future.

Exile and Everyday Life

Exile and Everyday Life focusses on the everyday life experience of refugees fleeing National Socialism in the 1930s and 1940s as well as the representation of this experience in literature and culture.

Jews and Other Germans

Examines the integration of Jews into German society between 1860-1925, taking as an example the city of Breslau (then Germany, now Wrocław, Poland). Questions whether there was a continuous line from the German treatment of Jews before World War I to Nazi antisemitism. During and after World War I, relations between Jews and non-Jews worsened and the high level of Jewish integration eroded between 1916-25. Although the constitution of the Weimar Republic accorded Jews equality, they experienced acts of violence and discrimination. Argues that antisemitism became stronger as the economic situation of the Jews deteriorated, due to inflation and the emigration to Germany of 4,273 impoverished Jews from Poland and Russia between 1919-23. Concludes, nevertheless, that no direct line can be drawn between the antisemitism in Imperial Germany and that of the Nazi period.

But although life is hard for the Melling family and the sisters have their tiffs, this is a heartwarming and often humorous story of loyalty and affection—under blue unclouded skies. Robin Klein was born 28 February 1936 in Kempsey, New South Wales into a family of nine children. Leaving school at age 15, Klein worked several jobs before becoming established as a writer, having her first story published at age 16. She would go on to write more than 40 books, including *Hating Alison Ashley* (adapted into a feature film starring Delta Goodrem in 2005), *Halfway Across the Galaxy and Turn Left* (adapted into a television series for the Seven Network in 1992), and *Came Back to Show You I Could Fly* (adapted into a film directed by Richard Lowenstein in 1993). Klein's books are hugely celebrated, having won the CBCA Children's Book of the Year Award in both the Younger Readers and the Older Readers categories, as well as a Human Rights Award for Literature in 1989 for *Came Back to Show You I Could Fly*.
