The 25 essays included concern studies from territorial legislation and administration studies to political debates; from conspiracy strategies to economic, cultural, social, religious, communicational and artistic matters. Such papers are to be considered an effort to synthesize the most recent historiographic perspectives, result of wide and inclusive academic discussions about the great turmoil of 1789-1849. The purpose is to provide new contributions to the current international debate on the revolutionary and counterrevolutionary movements of that period.

Che cosa è la storia contemporanea? In un presente dominato dagli effetti dei processi di globalizzazione la risposta a questa domanda non può che essere la storia di uno spazio-mondo capace di ricostruire sincronicamente le vicende di uomini e civiltà appartenenti ad etnie, culture e religioni differenti, dislocati nelle varie parti del pianeta. Oggi molte delle categorie attraverso le quali leggevamo la storia contemporanea (Stato, nazione, impero, classe) sono andate in crisi e hanno subito trasformazioni sostanziali. La globalizzazione e le sue conseguenze impongono di ripensare radicalmente i processi storici tenendo conto di uno spazio-mondo di cui sono protagonisti uomini e civiltà appartenenti ad etnie, culture e religioni differenti, dislocati in tutto il pianeta. Questo manuale, allora, si propone di ricostruire quella che definiamo come età contemporanea superando la periodizzazione tradizionale basata sul canone della storia nazionale ed europea. Momento inaugurale delle dinamiche dell'età contemporanea vengono considerate le trasformazioni mondiali imposte dall'imperialismo di fine Ottocento. Connessa a questa scelta cronologica sta quella geografica orientata a rivedere il rapporto centro-periferia, ovvero tra un Occidente centrale e propulsivo e il resto del mondo 'periferia', da considerarsi solo quando e se interagisce con il centro. I lunghi e travagliati processi dell'età contemporanea, infatti, hanno mostrato come nello spazio-mondo questa relazione sia mobile e duttile, oppure che le geometrie degli equilibri fluttuano spesso e rapidamente. Ma l'approccio qui utilizzato non rappresenta solo un correttivo geografico. A cambiare è la narrazione stessa che cerca di superare le problematizzazioni storiche più classiche. Temi transnazionali e trasversali (migrazioni, capitali e commercio, espansione degli imperi, circolazione delle idee) affiancano e contribuiscono a superare l'impostazione di una storia scritta esclusivamente dal punto di vista dei governi nazionali o incentrata sulle comunità geografiche. Ampio spazio è quindi dedicato a temi internazionali, ai nuovi protagonismi mondiali, alle nuove guerre, ai cambiamenti sociali e geopolitici degli ultimi decenni di cui si evidenziano le radici e l'evolversi nel passato più prossimo restituendo la giusta complessità al tempo che viviamo.

L'età contemporanea

Tutte le storie, è stato scritto, sono storie del mondo. Eppure di questo mondo noi conosciamo solo una piccola parte. Il nostro sguardo si è sempre concentrato a osservare il continente che abitiamo, l'Europa, o al più il nostro mare, il Mediterraneo. Proviamo allora ad ascoltare altri racconti per scoprire finalmente la parte che noi recitiamo su quel palcoscenico assai più vasto che è la vicenda millenaria degli uomini e delle donne. Mille anni di storia del mondo in poco più di mille pagine. Del mondo da quando si pensava fosse al centro dell'universo a oggi che ci appare un puntino blu perso nell'infinità del cosmo. Un mondo che già mille anni fa era interconnesso e globale. A renderlo tale gli uomini che lo percorrevano in tutta la sua estensione: i mercanti arabi che si spingevano fino alle coste della Spagna o ai confini dell'India, o quelli veneziani, come Marco Polo, che in Cina ci arrivarono attraverso la Via della seta e che consentirono all'Europa di conoscere la straordinaria realtà di un impero sapiente e organizzato posto all'altro capo del pianeta. E allora, oggi più che mai, è necessario restituire dignità alla storia delle civiltà e dei popoli che hanno abitato questo pianeta e che forse, troppo a lungo, abbiamo relegato ai margini. Non si tratta solo di far conoscere le storie dimenticate degli imperi africani e asiatici, delle cui epopee secolari pure sappiamo pochissimo, ma di mostrare i fili e i legami nascosti che uniscono la storia degli uomini sulla terra. Il racconto di migrazioni, conquiste, scoperte scientifiche porta alla luce proprio questa costante interconnessione che ci appare erroneamente come la grande novità del solo nostro tempo. Un'opera innovativa, che prova a superare le storie tradizionali, fatte solo di Stati, di confini, di guerre. Una storia del mondo che è oggi probabilmente l'unica storia possibile.

Spesso definiti come 'l'epoca della espansione dell'Europa nel mondo', i secoli della cosiddetta età moderna, dalla fine del Quattrocento alla fine dell'Ottocento, sono stati raccontati come un processo di progressiva, inarrestabile estensione del modello di civiltà europea alle altre parti del pianeta. Oggi, di fronte a rinnovati e non meno sconvolgenti processi di globalizzazione, la ricostruzione storica di quei secoli non può che farsi in maniera profondamente diversa. L'età moderna non è la marcia trionfale dell'Europa, dei suoi Stati, della sua economia, dei suoi valori, ma è il tempo di nascita dello spazio-mondo, attraverso la creazione di una serie di connessioni – politiche, economiche, culturali – che ora assumono una capillarità e una costanza di funzionamento mai possedute in precedenza. È in questi secoli che ciò che accade nei Caraibi o negli stretti delle Molucche rimbalza rapidamente a Londra o a Lisbona, ciò che a Istanbul decide il Sultano piega e spiega il Mediterraneo, così come quello che a Delhi progetta il grande imperatore Moghul si irraggia in uno spazio che va dalla Persia alle coste islamizzate dell'Africa orientale. Una storia che guarda alle connessioni non dimentica né gli spazi più tradizionali, né gli avvenimenti che vi si svolsero, comprendendo, ovviamente, in essi anche quelli dello spazio europeo. Ma le connessioni di una storia globale non seguono la geografia dei continenti e i confini delle nazioni. Li ridiscutono e li rimescolano, cercando di individuare attori e contesti che si fanno protagonisti delle differenti fasi storiche. E, sorprendentemente, questa ricerca, anche per secoli apparentemente lontani, mette allo scoperto geopolitiche che oggi ritroviamo attuali: la storia-mondo, dunque, come storia di lunga durata.

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Apuleius: Cupid and Psyche

Apuleius' story of Cupid and Psyche, the relationship of the human Soul with divine Love, is one of the great allegories of world literature. It forms an integral part of and profoundly illuminates the message of his novel *Metamorphoses* or *The Golden Ass*, which relates the adventures of a young man and his spiritual fall and redemption. To enrich and deepen his basic plot, the origins of which are obscure, Apuleius has combined poetic sources, Platonic philosophy and popular iconography in an unprecedented tour de force of literary creation. This edition sensitively elucidates the subtle art with which this transformation has been accomplished, and comprehensively illustrates both Apuleius' inventive handling of his various models and sources and the exuberant and idiosyncratic Latinity with forms the vehicle for it. It places in a fresh light the results of recent work on the ancient Novel and on Apuleius himself, and offers a stimulating, occasionally provocative, reading of his much-discussed text. Cupid and Psyche

Apuleius in European Literature

The story of Cupid and Psyche is first known through the Latin novel *Metamorphoses* or *The Golden Ass* by the second-century AD writer Apuleius—one of the few Latin fictions from Roman antiquity to have survived in its entirety. *Apuleius in European Literature: Cupid and Psyche since 1650* examines the reception of the long two-book romantic story of Cupid and Psyche in European literature from 1650 to the present day, with some attention also devoted to fine art and opera across this period. For over a century, the Danish thinker Søren Kierkegaard (1813–55) has been at the center of a number of important discussions, concerning not only philosophy and theology, but also, more recently, fields such as social thought, psychology, and contemporary aesthetics, especially literary theory. Despite his relatively short life, Kierkegaard was an extraordinarily prolific writer, as attested to by

the 26-volume Princeton University Press edition of all of his published writings. But Kierkegaard left behind nearly as much unpublished writing, most of which consists of what are called his "journals and notebooks." Kierkegaard has long been recognized as one of history's great journal keepers, but only rather small portions of his journals and notebooks are what we usually understand by the term "diaries." By far the greater part of Kierkegaard's journals and notebooks consists of reflections on a myriad of subjects—philosophical, religious, political, personal. Studying his journals and notebooks takes us into his workshop, where we can see his entire universe of thought. We can witness the genesis of his published works, to be sure—but we can also see whole galaxies of concepts, new insights, and fragments, large and small, of partially (or almost entirely) completed but unpublished works. Kierkegaard's Journals and Notebooks enables us to see the thinker in dialogue with his times and with himself. Kierkegaard wrote his journals in a two-column format, one for his initial entries and the second for the extensive marginal comments that he added later. This edition of the journals reproduces this format, includes several photographs of original manuscript pages, and contains extensive scholarly commentary on the various entries and on the history of the manuscripts being reproduced. Volume 8 of this 11-volume series includes five of Kierkegaard's important "NB" journals (Journals NB21 through NB25), which cover the period from September 1850 to June 1852, and which show Kierkegaard alternately in polemical and reflective postures. The polemics emerge principally in Kierkegaard's opposition to the increasing infiltration of Christianity by worldly concerns, a development that in his view had accelerated significantly in the aftermath of the political and social changes wrought by the Revolution of 1848. Kierkegaard understood the corrupting of Christianity to be in the interest of the powers that be, and he directed his criticism at politicians, the press, and especially the Danish Church itself, particularly church officials who claimed to be "reformers." On the reflective side, Kierkegaard delves into a number of authors and religious figures, some of them for the first time, including Montaigne, Pascal, Seneca, Savonarola, Wesley, and F. W. Newman. These journals also contain Kierkegaard's thoughts on the decisions surrounding the publication of the "Anti-Climacus" writings: *The Sickness unto Death* and especially *Practice in Christianity*. Kierkegaard's reader gets the sense both of a gathering storm—by the close of the last journal in this volume, the famous "attack on Christendom" is less than three years away—and a certain hesitancy: What needs reforming, Kierkegaard insists, is not "the doctrine" or "the Church," but "existences," i.e., lives.

The Greek World of Apuleius

The first three chapters of this book elucidate the scholastic goals of both classical cultures during the Roman Imperial period. Apuleius' works share the stage in these chapters with representatives of the second-century Greek cultural paradigm. They define patterns of discourse and fit selected examples of analogous Apuleian strategies into the broader cultural framework. Subsequent chapters focus closely on the complete Apuleian corpus under the general headings of Apuleius in the roles of orator, philosopher and novelist. Literature and Identity in The Golden Ass of Apuleius is the first English translation of a work published in 2007 as *Le Metamorfosi di Apuleio: Letteratura e identità*, by Luca Graverini. The second-century CE novel *The Golden Ass*, or *Metamorphoses*, has proven to be both captivating and highly entertaining to the modern reader, but the text also presents the critic with a vast array of interpretive possibilities. In fact, there is little consensus among scholars on the fundamental significance of Apuleius' novel: is it simply a form of narrative entertainment, or does it represent some sort of religious or philosophical propaganda? Can it be interpreted as a satire of fatuous belief in otherworldly powers, or is it an utterly aporetic text? Graverini begins by setting *The Golden Ass* in its ancient literary context. Apuleius' playful defiance of generic conventions represents a substantial literary innovation, but he is also taking part in a tradition of narrative and satirical literature that typically featured experimentation with genre. The interplay of generic elements found in *The Golden Ass* reflects the complexity of the author's cultural identity: Apuleius was a Roman North African who had traveled widely throughout the Mediterranean

and enjoyed an extensive education in both Greek and Latin. Graverini concludes with a study of the complex interaction of these three dimensions of Apuleius' identity (African, Roman, and Greek), and investigates what the narrative can tell us about the culture of its readership. These cultural interactions affirm that *The Golden Ass* aims to delight its readers as well as to exhort them to religion and philosophy. Ben Lee's superb new translation will make Graverini's groundbreaking study available to a much wider scholarly readership.

The aim of this book is to ascertain how ancient Greek and Latin authors, both pagan and Christian, formulated and answered what is now called the problem of evil.
